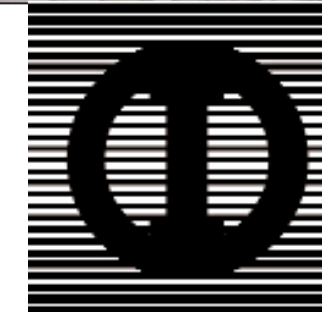

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SIOP Foundation 2010-2011 Annual Report

Building for the future—that's what the SIOP Foundation is all about. By providing SIOP members and other contributors the opportunity to leverage contributions as tax-deductible gifts, the SIOP Foundation is SIOP's partner in a grand venture. SIOP is the connecting point for integrating science and practice at work. As a voluntary association of professionals, thousands have contributed ideas, talent, and effort to achieve SIOP's past and present successes. It is the world's leader in fostering and showcasing evidence-based practice for human resource issues in private, public, and volunteer organizations.

Since 1996 the SIOP Foundation has received \$1,348,350 in contributions and an additional \$744,152 in pledges. Every pledge has been honored. Our total assets have grown 22% in the past 12 months and once again exceed \$2 million. These are turbulent economic times, but nevertheless we are continuing to build.

Some SIOP members have been able to be extraordinarily generous in helping to advance our mission. This year we recognize Jack Wiley and also Joyce and Robert Hogan; they join the list of distinguished benefactors who got the SIOP Foundation going, a list that began with the founding gift from Bill and Barbara Owens. At the SIOP Conference in San Diego next spring the initial Hogan and Wiley Awards winners will be announced.

We are continuing to build because over 200 SIOP members have been and continue to be extremely generous. Undesignated contributions go into the Advancement Fund, which has garnered more than \$815,000 since its inception, and paid out over \$159,000 for small grants and scholarship supplements. I hope that in the coming year we will realize major additions to our Advancement and Scholarship funds.

Foundations are able to grow their assets while simultaneously providing proceeds to support approved scientific, educational, and charitable causes. Since its beginning the SIOP Foundation has provided support to SIOP of \$340,354, consisting of income from the endowment of the contributions. SIOP used all of this funding to provide scholarships, awards, and small grants, doing so without having to dip into member dues or other revenues. Thus your contributions to the Foundation extend SIOP's impact and effectiveness in building our vital applied science community.

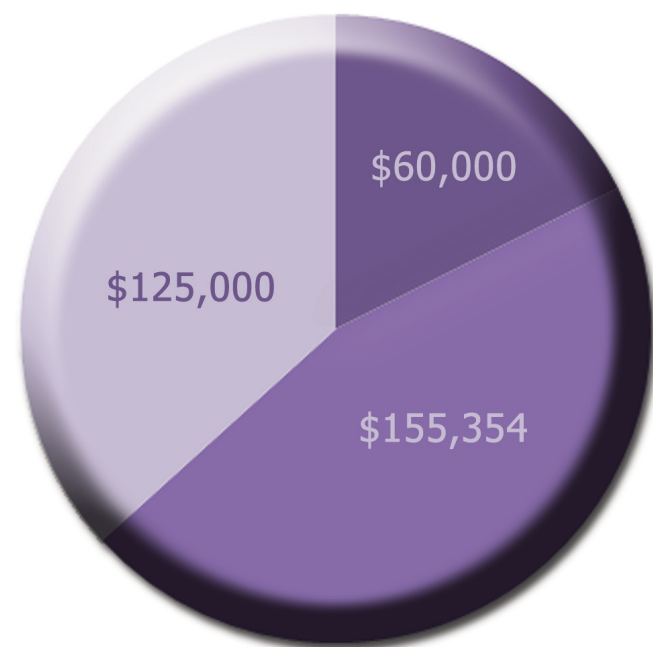

Kristen M. Shockley, PhD, Assistant Professor of Psychology, Baruch College, City University of New York
Won the 2010 Mary Tenopyr Graduate Student Scholarship award for her dissertation proposal, "You Can't Always Get What You Want, but Does It Matter?"



"Winning the Mary Tenopyr graduate student scholarship was very meaningful to me. Aside from the publication process, winning the award was the first time I had received recognition for a project that I was leading. This gave me confidence in myself as a scholar, which I think is very important for someone beginning an academic career. It also made me feel a greater connection with the SIOP community. Additionally, the monetary reward was very helpful, as I used the funds to compensate research participants.

I feel much more of a connection with SIOP since winning the award. I think the Foundation plays a very important role in both integrating new psychologists into the field and helping maintain high standards for science and practice. Won the 2010 Leslie Joyce and Paul W. Thayer Fellowship for a summary of two research projects titled "Applicant Reactions to Online Employment Testing."

"The first project examined the role of testing environment characteristics in predicting applicant reactions and outcomes. The second examined the role of internal versus external candidate status in the relationships between reactions and outcomes."
